No incidents reported on recent branch trips (except for tired legs!). Stay safe over the summer holidays.

NATIONAL OFFICE

National Office have just received an offer from Wellington Branch to run the **2018 conference**. National Office welcome this offer and more de-tails will follow as they become available.

The **Molesworth 1080 operation** went ahead with 64,000 hectares treated. The Marlborough branch have undertaken a post operation survey by helicopter and on foot to gauge the effect on the deer population. Tissue samples have been sent for testing. The data will be analysed by independent scientists and the lessons learned

in setting up the survey will be useful for future occasions. Funding for the survey has come from Marlborough with assistance from the NZDA Research Fund, Nelson and other branches. A "give a little" page has been set up: <u>https://givealittle.co.nz/cause/molesworthsurvey?_ga=2.231221146.464805147.1510195959-1020872785.1510195959</u> Snow Hewetson has generously given a prize of a guided tahr hunt to the value of \$5000 to be drawn from anyone who contributes \$100 or more to this page.

The **Police Secure Storage Policy** has been under scrutiny with draft documents released for public consultation. The documents have been analysed by the security sub-committee of the Firearms Community Advisory Forum and it appears that police are listening to that committee's concerns as well as feedback from other firearm interests including NZDA.

The **WARO permit consultation program** of three meetings (Palmerston North, Wanaka, Christchurch) was expected to look at the whole role of WARO in an environment very different from the decades of rampant meat recovery. The agenda put out by DOC includes topics that appear to have little relation to WARO and the effect of operations on recreational hunters. NZDA has a clear view of how it would like to see WARO operating – NZDA is supportive of a sustainable WARO industry –a small number of operators each operating in an exclusive area with very tight criteria for what and when harvest can occur. NZDA believes there is an important role for WARO in harvesting surplus animals as part of an overall herd management plan. NZDA is concerned that the long anticipated and promised review of WARO will be postponed in favour of another issue of permits to each and every person with a helicopter and the continuance of distrust and lack of confidence in DOC's ability to monitor WARO operations.

Like most of NZ we are waiting to see which way new ministers will direct their departments. Conservation and Police are the two most important to hunters. A green minister of conservation with a record of expressed reservations on the GAC and a view that deer have no place in NZ will not inspire confidence among hunters. The last Minister of Police was favourably disposed to the firearms community and her strong stance against some of the extreme views of the police association gave licence holders some confidence that common sense would prevail. We will watch our new ministers very carefully. NZDA can take some solace that is both areas of public policy we have been successful in establishing a profile of responsibility and relationships that will be valuable in advocating on behalf of recreational hunters. At the end of November COLFO were scheduled to hold a meeting with Stuart Nash the new Minister of Police, it is hoped he will reveal his intentions in respect of any new firearm legislation and in particular his plans for the recommendations made by the Select Committee Inquiry into Illegal firearms, of which he was a member.

COLFO

COLFO was at the **UN Arms Treaty Session** in Geneva Switzerland in early October. COLFO understands that in the modern world, we simply cannot focus only on the picture for New Zealand, as there is an International Aspect as well. The UN Arms Trade Treaty is designed with the laudable and important goal of preventing military items from feeding conflicts in places like Sierra Leonie. Unfortunately, COLFO believes that the treaty could be used to prevent you from enjoying your sport by restricting, for example, the international shipment of ammunition. Our Rep attended the meeting to ensure that the NZ delegation did not take a stance that would restrict New Zealanders. Working closely with our friends from other International organisations, we also lobbied in relation to other aspects of international arms control such as the Programme of Action. We can report that we consider the UN ATT to be a failing treaty due to lack of international ratification. However, the UN Programme of Action on Small Arms remains very problematic for us and we will continue to ensure that your rights are not restricted via the international processes. COLFO is greatly appreciative of Grant Fletcher who volunteered his time to attend the ATT on our behalf.

Alpers Likens Kiwi Gun Laws to the USA

Yes, he is back that vocal anti gun advocate who fled to Australia when his efforts failed here back in the late 1990s. He will be performing alongside Professor Gillespie at an Otago University Summer School to be held in Wellington on 14 February on the subject of Firearms and Public Health. Fortunately our own Nicole Mckee, a firearm safety specialist, will also be speaking to provide counter arguments.

By likening Kiwi gun laws to the USA in a recent media article, Mr Alpers is deliberately misleading the public; such a comparison is like comparing one apple to a whole fruit market. Does he not know that the USA is comprised of 50 States, all of which have their own gun laws, some very strict and other not so. Similarly the size and ethnic mix of the population and the social issues in each state vary considerably thus affecting the prevalence of gun ownership and gun crime. In the US a firearm is viewed by many people as a weapon for self defence whereas in New Zealand it is simply an item of sporting equipment or a tool for farmers and hunters. There is no comparison that can be made between the two countries.

About Bloody time by Aaron Loder

As soon as I shot my first deer last year, I knew that I wanted my teenage boys to shoot the next couple. As a mad keen fisherman, I was a late arrival to the hunting scene. I wish I had started a couple of decades earlier, but from what I hear from the experienced blokes, it seems that there has never been so many deer around as right now anyway.

It would also be fair to say that looking back over the last twelve months, it might have been easier to take a different route. It might have been quicker if I had continued with the rifle and had him tagging along taking

it all in. Instead I handed the rifle to my youngest son on our next hunt and the next eleven after that. I think we have managed to find new ways to stuff things up on a number of hunts, but at least we haven't made the same mistake twice (at least so far).

On the first Roar hunt, we had a spiker walk up over a bank to see who we were. He walked down to within 20 m, at which point I was waiting for my son to flatten him. The shot never came and the spiker turned around and casually walked away back up the bank. He eventually twigged we were there and disappeared back over the top. I asked him why he didn't shoot and he said "I was waiting for him to stop".

Technical difficulties have played a part, with scope screws coming loose and affecting shot placement. New rings and some locktite sorted that issue out. I've still put tiny drops of twink on the screws and rings to see if anything moves on me. I'm a trusting prick like that.

On this particular evening we were back on a friendly farm down South Wairarapa in a paddock with a bush edge. It was mid-November so I was hoping for a hungry deer to pop out on to the grass. With Hinds dropping fawns, I told Sam to go for a Spiker first, yearling hind second or young stag. The way this paddock runs, Sam was facing down hill overlooking the bottom of the paddock, while I was about 25 m up the hill looking the opposite way, up towards the top of the paddock. As we had bush running up one edge, the deer could pop out anywhere. We had only been there for ten minutes and I was just thinking "I wonder how loud that rifle would be if Sam does see something' and BOOM. Followed be "He's down!!!! Whhhhooo!!" A lone spiker had popped out of the bush and turned broadside. 160 m shot took him in the shoulder, exiting mid flank on the other side. He was that excited that he wanted to put another one in just to make sure, I said no as the deer was dead and was just doing a final lash out.

We then wandered down and spent a couple of moments just taking it all in, and a quick thank you to the deer for giving its life. Success for Sam felt better than success for me. An introduction to gutting and setting up a deer backpack, then he had to get in, roll over and get up. Then the huffing and puffing really started. I waited till he was buggered and then made one comment about how heavy the rifle and the head were and he went off, I was called everything under the sun and a few more. You just can't help some people.

Back to the ute, quick stop in with the farmer to thank him for letting us on and then back home. It may not be the most photographed deer in history, but it did get its moment in the Sun. Here's hoping the next one doesn't take 12 months like the last one did.
